
The Role of Democracy for People around the World in Creating a Peaceful Society without Nuclear Weapons and War: Is it Good to Die for the Country?

Dani Nehushtai is a woodcraft artist based in Saitama Prefecture, and the author of "Is It Good to Die for the Country?" He is seriously considering the role of democracy for people around the world and the role people should play in creating a peaceful society without nuclear weapons or war. For that reason, he has been taking part in up to 80 annual invited lectures and various social activities with his colleagues.

Especially, from a critical perspective, he analyzes the current situation in both Israel and Japan: the expansion of Israeli occupation and attacks on Palestine, the social structure behind the occupation, the military industrial expansion and the involvement of major powers, the expansion of nuclear power and military spending in Japan. This presentation will give you an opportunity to think about the role of democracy, and what we should do to break the silence in this critical situation.
